



An investigative journey into the heart of one of Chile's most renowned private nature reserves, the Huilo-Huilo Biological Reserve, uncovers rampant ecological malpractice, faulty accountability mechanisms, and a greenwashing conspiracy led by one of Chile's richest mining magnates. We reveal how ecotourism and private conservation are being used to greenwash environmental abuse and the excessive accumulation of land.





Through collaborations with local community members and organizations, the film aims to drive tangible change. We're working with regional and local partners to create leverage to improve working conditions and quality of life for residents in the reserve. Ultimately, the film seeks to educate audiences about the dangers of greenwashing, the limitations of ecolabels, and the critical importance of prioritizing local ownership in conservation efforts.

# SPEAKING TRUTH TO POWER



#### **Waitress**

She works as a seasonal waitress in Huilo-Huilo's hotels. When unsafe working conditions lead to irreparable damage to her hands, she charts a course to take collective action against the reserve.



### **Former Forestry Worker**

He recounts his experiences in a workers' rights movement that once swept the region and seeks meaning in a present that at times seems less hopeful than the past.

Antonio works events at Huilo-Huilo to cover the business debts of his new catering business. When Huilo-Huilo stops paying him, he begins to challenge the reserve's predatory practices.

out against the deception.




### Benja, Investigator


